

UFAW ANIMAL WELFARE STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

UFAW first established a student scholarship scheme in 1983 to enable students to pursue their interests in animal welfare and to provide them with the opportunity to conduct relevant research or other (e.g. educational) projects. The scheme has been extremely worthwhile, resulting in a high standard of project reports and findings of practical benefit to the welfare of animals.

Who is eligible to apply?

Applications are welcome from undergraduates (or equivalent) who will usually be studying in agricultural, biological, psychological, veterinary or zoological sciences. However, we would be pleased to receive applications from students from other disciplines who are interested in carrying out a project related to animal welfare. Students must be registered at either a university or college in the British Isles or an overseas institution at which there is a UFAW University Link. Applications from MSc students on appropriate courses will also be considered.

How much is the award?

Successful applicants receive £170 subsistence and £30 departmental expenses for every week of study up to a maximum of **£1600**. Projects may be carried out at anytime and usually last between four and eight weeks. Projects may last for longer but funding will only be provided for up to eight weeks.

What is involved?

Projects must be relevant to improving the welfare of farm, laboratory, companion, zoo or wild animals whose welfare is compromised by humans. Project work undertaken may be part of a student's course, an extension of course-work, or a new project on a topic of interest to the applicant. Students are encouraged to design their own project proposals, but they should seek guidance from tutors and heads of department to ensure that the proposal has a sound scientific methodology, that all necessary facilities are available, and that the work will be properly supervised. Alternatively, supervisors who find a suitable candidate can apply.

Applying for an award

All applications should be submitted on an application form (available from UFAW). The form asks for a concise outline of the proposed study and, where applicable, reference to scientific papers or other work relevant to the investigation.

Applications must include a reference from the supervisor and comments by the Head of Department. If a student is to conduct the project at an external establishment (eg zoo or research institute) they must seek prior permission in writing from the appropriate person (eg curator, director).

Applications should include details of:

- Aim
- Methods
- If animals are to be involved, the number and type of animals to be studied.
- Details of any necessary ethical approvals or licence
- Animal welfare benefits: how the work may lead to improvements in animals' quality of life. NB Much as UFAW applauds research that advances species conservation and other important issues – this scholarship scheme is for work that addresses animal welfare.
- How any significant findings will be used and/or made available to others (eg publications/presentations)

Completed applications must reach the UFAW offices by **28th February 2011**.

The applications will be assessed by a panel of judges and then all applicants will be notified of the outcome of this process. Successful students will receive full details and administrative notes at this stage.

The final report

On completion of their project, scholars are required to write up and submit an original full report of their work, including an abstract, by 1st November of the same year. Additionally, UFAW regularly holds a meeting for Student Scholars at which scholars are expected to talk about their work. The meeting is usually held in December.

Examples of past Scholarship projects

- *Welfare issues in fish: the interplay of pain, fear and stress?*
- *What is enriching about enrichment? Investigating properties of materials used in enrichment for pigs*
- *Impacts of capture and handling on wild birds*
- *Using fracture classification to distinguish between accidental injury and non-accidental injury in dogs and cats*

What is UFAW?
